I spent many nights teaching myself to write basic code, enough to secure an interview and attain an entry level position at a software company.

Here, I thrived. My thirst for knowledge, work ethic, resilience, and willingness to listen and adapt my behaviors helped propel me to several promotions. Within a few years of beginning this career, I managed a small team of developers and was responsible for the technical success of highly complex projects. After building an impressive resume and a solid reputation as someone who could "get things done," I rose through the ranks. I sold my house, sold or stored most of my possessions, then spent two months hiking in the backcountry. During this journey, I reconnected with the natural world. I once again found a "why" for my education. I decided to enroll back in school to help fight for the earth with which I am deeply connected. In classes, my focus has been on environmental justice, urban planning, and public policy. I have been able to integrate my previous experiences with new knowledge. This marriage of operational excellence and environmental studies provides me with a unique perspective on how to effectively create change for good.

I am interested in pursuing a specialization around Urban Planning and Sustainable

Development within the Master of Environmental Studies program. Having lived in a wide range
of areas- rural, urban, suburban- all with various approaches to planning and development, I have
seen successes and failures of multitudinous programs. I have seen firsthand the benefits to
individuals, communities, and local businesses provided through sustainably-focused and
thoughtful urban and regional planning. I have seen social lift and equitable solutions delivered
through business development under an environmental justice lens. As I have spent most of my
free time outdoors, I understand the interconnectedness of the natural world to human emotion. I
am also aware that the climate crisis is the greatest challenge of our time. All of these issues are
directly connected to each other and intersect within the practices of Urban Planning and
Sustainable Development. I desire the opportunity to apply my experience, knowledge, and
talents to these efforts.

I have worked with diverse groups to achieve lofty targets. Within my corporate career, I became a talented project manager and people manager. I bring operational excellence, organizational skills, and collaborative spirit to every pursuit. I have no doubt in my ability to translate my wide array of knowledge to a career in sustainability.
