Credit System and Calendar: The Valparaiso University calendar is based on the semester system. A standard semester contains at least 15 weeks of instruction, including final exams. Beginning Summer 1993, summer sessions are six weeks in length. Beginning Summer 2013, summer sessions are six or twelve weeks in length, but the calendar for individual courses may vary. MBA sessions in the Fall and Spring are eight weeks in length. The summer session in the Law School is seven weeks in length. In all cases, the usual three-credit lecture class meets for a minimum of approximately 2100 minutes, excluding the final examination period.

From Fall 1928 to Fall 1973 the University used a letter grade without pluses or minuses based on a 3.0 point system (A = 3.0). From Fall 1973 to Fall 1979 the University used a numerical system with 4 as the highest grade (grade of 4 = 4 points) and with 0.5 increments. From Spring 1972 through Spring 1988 the Law School used a numerical grading system based on a 100-point scale.

<u>Good Academic Standing</u>: An undergraduate or law student with a cumulative GPA of 2.000 or above or a graduate student with a cumulative GPA of 3.000 or above is considered to be in good academic standing.

The Valpo Core Course (CORE 110, CORE 115): The Valpo Core Course is a two-semester course required of all first-year students not enrolled in the Christ College Honors Programs. The Core courses are interdisciplinary in nature: CORE 110 may be transferred as 3 credits of English composition and 1 credit of English literature, CORE 115 may be transferred as 3 credits of non-U.S. History and 1 credit of philosophy/theology.

Transfer Credit: Credits earned at accredited institutions are generally accepted if the grades are C- or above (C or above for the Law School and B or above for the Graduate Division) and the courses are appropriate to the degree. When there is an equivalency, the course numbers and titles reflect Valparaiso University equivalents. Grades are not recorded and do not count in computing a student's GPA; credits appear in the completed hours total (also attempted hours for Law School). The college offering the degree program determines transfer credit acceptability toward particular degree requirements.

<u>Christ College</u> is the University's Undergraduate Honors College. All courses in Christ College carry the prefix CC. Graduates are designated "Christ College Scholars" or "Christ College Associates", having completed a program emphasizing liberal and interdisciplinary studies at a high academic level.
