Statement of Interest

Environmental studies is a broad subject, with many aspects and different disciplines. Maybe that's why I have felt so drawn to it; as a student, I have always been interested in a variety of different things, and my undergraduate career primarily was spent dabbling in various areas to see what clicked. Many of these subjects were interesting but not ultimately the perfect fit. However, with every element that resonated, I always found it traced back to studying the environment.
