My name is Jonathan Legin, and I am excited to apply for the Master of Environmental Studies (MES) program. Pursuing this degree aligns with my passion for environmental conservation and education, and I am eager to further my knowledge and impact in the field.

My academic journey began at Green River College, where I took an Environmental Studies class in 2019. This course was a turning point for me, as it opened my eyes to the significant challenges facing our ecosystems due to human activities. This realization fueled my desire to make a difference. Although I explored other career paths, I found true fulfillment in environmental work.

Presenting my project to professionals from Parks and my professors was a proud moment, as it showcased my ability to turn ideas into actionable environmental initiatives.

My experiences have reinforced my belief in the power of education and community involvement in environmental conservation. Teaching landowners and volunteers about sustainable practices is just as crucial as hands-on restoration work. By joining the MES program, I hope to deepen my understanding of environmental science and policy, equipping myself with the knowledge and skills necessary to drive meaningful change on a larger scale.
