GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Thirty-two courses, and an overall grade point average of 2.00 or above, are required for the Bachelor of Arts degree. As of fall 2004, students must complete at least 30 of the 32 courses required for graduation from college course work taken after having matriculated into an undergraduate college degree program (either to Pomona College or another college or university). A maximum of two pre-matriculation credits are allowed (e.g., from Advanced Placement credit).

CREDIT SYSTEM

A full course consists of approximately one-fourth of the work expected during one semester and is equivalent to four semester or six quarter hours. Courses in which a laboratory is required will have "with laboratory" in the course title. Half- and quarter-courses ("cumulative courses") are also offered.

Cumulative courses are valued at one-fourth course credit and involve participation in areas such as music, physical education and theater. Once the maximum allowable number of cumulative courses has been completed (8), the transcript will display zero credit for each cumulative course taken. Prior to 2009, cumulative courses in music were awarded letter grades but were not calculated in the Pomona College grade point average.

Cumulative courses for students who graduated prior to Fall 1997 were accounted as follows: Two semesters of cumulative work were awarded one-half-course credit. The first (un-credited) cumulative course lists zero credit completed; the second received one-half course credit.

Courses taken prior to 1999 display a leading number (4) as the first character of the course designation. The leading 4 should be disregarded in the interpretation of the transcript. For example, 4ART5PO is the same course as ART 005 PO.

Half-course internship notations, as of summer 2004. Pomona College does not award graduation credit for internships that are not course requirements, among others, for a regular course. However, internships completed under the supervision of its Career Development Office are displayed as valued as half-course credit on the student's academic transcript. Such half-courses are described on the transcript but are not counted toward the courses needed for graduation.

Repeat of courses

When a student repeats a course that is not otherwise repeatable for credit, the original course and grade remain a part of the student's record, regardless of the original grade. Grade points for the repeated work are calculated into the grade point average, but additional graduation credit is only awarded if the original grade was F, NP or NC.

LETTER GRADES AND GRADE POINTS

The College defines grades as follows:

A, Exemplary; B, Accomplished; C, Adequate; D, Deficient; F, Unacceptable. Plus and minus marks reflect finer distinctions.*

Grade points are assigned on the following scale:

A student's Pomona College cumulative grade point average (GPA) is computed by dividing the sum of the grade points earned by the total number of courses attempted (with grade points) in all Pomona courses, in courses taken in Pomona College off-campus programs, abroad or in the United States, and in courses taken through cross-enrollment in The Claremont Colleges except courses taken on a Pass/No Pass or CR/NC grading basis.

Pass/No Pass Grading (P/NP)

P: Pass, work equivalent to C or higher NP:

No credit, work equivalent to C- or lower

Courses graded on the P/NP system are not entered into the grade point average calculation. Grades in courses in which the student opted for a credit/no credit option (CR/NC) (as opposed to courses in which the P/NP option is automatic) are identified on the official transcript as CR or NC to indicate that the student elected the CR/NC grading option.

*Prior to Fall 2021 the grade of A+ was available, indicating superlative achievement. A+ does not earn additional grade points.

**Each of the undergraduate Claremont Colleges awards course units except Harvey Mudd College, which uses a semester-hour system. Courses taken at HMC are normally converted to Pomona courses according to the following formula: a 3- or 4-semester hour course taken at HMC is converted to one Pomona course; a 2-semester hour course is converted to a half course; a 1-semester hour course is converted to a quarter Pomona course.

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
