To Whom It May Concern:

I first worked with Josh Fritch in Word Play, an interdisciplinary humanities and literary arts class in 2021 which I co-taught with classicist, Dr. Andrew Reece. Participants in this inquiry-driven, foundational program read ancient and contemporary literature with a focus on the poetics of catastrophe. We studied the formal properties and historical contingencies of a range of kinds of writing in several genres and styles with a focus, on the one hand, on catastrophe, and on the other hand, on play.

The program demanded intensive reading and writing, independent initiative, the ability to work autonomously, shared leadership, and collaborative learning. In all of these areas Josh excelled, participated collaboratively, generously, and whole heartedly, and completed all work with high levels of engagement and thought.

I also sponsored Josh's Individual Learning Contract, Learning to Understand: Literature, Creative Writing, and Philosophy which entailed a contemplative exploration of inner life, selfhood, and wisdom teachings through a solitary hiking trip of over 70 miles; fiction writing, essay writing, discussion, and weekly reflections; and readings in contemporary literature and Buddhist philosophy, including texts by Pema Chodron, Khaled Hosseini, among others.

Joshua completed an impressive amount of writing for this summer ILC project, including three major projects: a deeply thoughtful, well-crafted and lucid philosophical essay of 25 pages; a one week solo backpacking trip of 73 miles and a 7-page paper on what the trip was like and the things Joshua learned; and a nearly 50-page literary science-fiction story in the vein of Philip K. Dick, exploring consciousness, simulacra, AI and representations of self. Joshua's work this summer reflects a passion for thinking, wonder, curiosity, reflection, and contemplative and spiritual practices through writing, reading, discussion, and that activity beloved of philosophers and writers, long, solitary walks. In our meetings I was struck by Joshua's capacity for speculative, open-ended, and courageous inquiry into suffering, cognition, and mind.

Josh engages sincerely, works hard, participates, brings deep care to academic work and collaborative learning, and will make an excellent graduate student. I believe Josh will make a gifted and wonderful teacher and I recommend Josh strongly!
