ACCREDITATION

College of the Atlantic (COA) is accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC).

CALENDAR AND GRADING SYSTEM

Since September 1982, the academic year at College of the Atlantic has been divided into three ten-week terms. A full-time course load for a term is three courses, each worth one (COA) credit. **The credit hour equivalent to one COA credit is 3.3 semester credit hours.**

From Fall 1978 through Summer 1982, the COA academic year was divided into two 14-week semesters and two intensive short terms. The credit hour equivalent of one COA credit was four (4) semester credit hours. Prior to Fall 1978, the academic year was divided into three 10-week terms. The credit hour equivalent to one COA credit was three (3) semester credit hours.

College of the Atlantic students may elect to take their courses for letter grades or for credit/no credit.

Letter Grades – College of the Atlantic does not assign a numerical value to letter grades because it does not calculate a grade point average (GPA).

DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

The Bachelor of Arts degree at College of the Atlantic requires a minimum of 36 (COA) credits. Prior to September 1982, the number of credits required for the BA varied between 32 and 36 depending upon when the coursework was done.

Students must also complete an **Internship** in a job related to their field of interest or occupational goal. This degree requirement may be done for three (3) credits or for zero (0) credit.

The Master of Philosophy degree at College of the Atlantic requires a minimum of 18 (COA) credits.

EDUCATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS

College of the Atlantic belongs to a consortium of colleges that make up the EcoLeague. Students may elect to complete coursework at any of the participating institutions for a term while remaining enrolled at COA. Credit earned at the visited EcoLeague institution by a COA student is certified, then awarded as College of the Atlantic credit. EcoLeague credit is identified on the COA transcript. The EcoLeague institutions are Alaska Pacific University, College of the Atlantic, Dickinson College, Green Mountain College, Northland College, and Prescott College.

College of the Atlantic had a similar agreement with Olin College from 2005-2011. COA also has formal agreements to award credit for select programs offered by independent organizations specializing in college-level, experiential learning.
