Dear Principal and Cooperating Teacher,

I am a student in The Evergreen State College Master in Teaching Program, seeking a placement for Student Teaching for spring of 2010.

In August of 2007, I severely broke my leg climbing and was forced to take time off of work as I was unable to walk for four months. During that time, I had the opportunity to volunteer at a Whatcom Day Academy in Bellingham, Washington. What began as a volunteer opportunity, setting up the school library, turned into employment and a renewed commitment to working with children. Through both high school and my undergraduate degree process, my most valuable experiences came from working with children, tutoring my peers, and advocating for the rights of those around me. I am a learner, first and foremost, and feel that this will translate well in a field where we teach young people the beauty of using their minds, being thoughtful individuals, citizens, and consumers. I want to help children enter communities of inquiry and critical thinking and develop the skills which will serve as a springboard for the rest of their educational lives.

I believe that it is necessary for students and teachers to be self-reflective, examine and question the influences manifest in their ideologies, values, and individual ethos. I hope that through this process, students will begin to better understand the tools they *already* possess; the tools within themselves that they can utilize to create a better world.

My observations and fall student teaching experiences have been excellent for helping me to develop into a better instructor, and my focus has been largely on instructional delivery and timing. I have also learned a great deal about classroom management, interdisciplinary education, and community-based learning and am excited about the prospect of furthering this inquiry at your school. I am very passionate about mathematics and in helping students to grow into strong mathematicians at a time when so many individuals learn to dislike the subject. My Masters Thesis has to do with math-related self-efficacy and the context-specific belief that you can achieve success in learning and mastering mathematical content. I am excited to continue to develop tools to support student self-belief through working with a mentor teacher in this student teaching experience.

I volunteered at Whatcom Day Academy (for a total of 170 hours) until I was hired in a more permanent position. I co-coordinated the placement of the school's library books into an electronic Dewy Decimal system. In addition to my library duties, I also helped in individual classrooms where I worked one-on-one with students on a variety of projects. I concurrently worked as a lunchroom and recess duty and was the primary library teacher for the pre-K and kindergarten classes. I created group projects and worked with "Zoo-phonics" to encourage children to inquire and read. As of the first of May, 2007, I was also a substitute teacher in the pre-K to third grade classrooms three days a week and provided aid to teachers wherever else it was needed.
