Participants earn a master's degree and certification while obtaining the critical understanding and skills needed to teach in today's diverse public schools. Our MIT program strives to prepare teachers to create culturally responsive, equitable learning environments that support student engagement and achievement. The program focuses on:

- Attention to the diverse social, emotional, physiological and cognitive development of children and youth
- Guidance towards practicing democratic, inclusive decision making within public school classrooms as a means of helping K12 students become citizens who care about equity and justice
- Creation of curriculum that reflects the interests of children and youth, as well as local, state and national learning goals
- Incorporation of the arts and active learning practices across K12 curricula

Evergreen's MIT program mirrors the original mission of the college with its cross-curricular, interdisciplinary program, interactive student-teacher dialogue, learning across significant differences, small group seminars, group problem solving activities, and narrative evaluations instead of letter grades.
