National Landscape on Immigration

- History of Exclusion
 - 1882 Chinese Exclusion Act
 - Immigration Act of 1917
 - 1950 Internal Security Act
 - Plyler v. Doe in 1982
 - Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals in 2012
 - Many more...
- 45's Administration
 - Judicial appointments
 - Elimination of existing forms of protection from deportation
 - Escalation of aggressive and discriminatory enforcement tactics

Federal Immigration Policy Challenges

• "Why don't undocumented people just apply for residency to legalize their status?" The process is:

- Unpredictable
- Timely
- Narrow
- Costly

How do we move towards comprehensive immigration reform?

- Pathways to citizenship for DREAMers and more
- Decreased interior enforcement
- No more detention centers
- No funding for a border wall
- Increased staffing to process visas
- No mandatory E-Verify process for employment authorization

What might college look like for undocumented students in WA?

Undocumented High School Students

- Socialized to believe college is out of their financial means
- Limited knowledge on undocumented support in K-12 setting
- Language barriers as an English Language Learner (ELL)
- 65,000 graduate each year


Documented College Students

- U.S. citizens
- Permanent/legal residents
- Documented international students

Undocumented College Students

- Entered the United States without federal authorization
- Overstayed a visa or permit
- Brought to the United States as a child
- May not know of documentation status

Resources Available By State



Washington State Policies HB 1079 (Real Hope Act)

- HB 1079 students are considered "residents" for purposes of higher education. This means HB 1079 students are permitted to pay "instate" tuition rates to attend Washington's public colleges and universities.
- Who qualifies as a '1079 student'?

1. You lived in Washington state at least three consecutive years

2. You graduated from a Washington state high school and you completed your senior year of high school in Washington; <u>or</u> you earned the equivalent of a high school diploma, such as a GED.

• HB 1079 Students complete an <u>affidavit</u> as part of their admission

WASFA (WA DREAM Act)

In 2014, the state Legislature approved SB 6523, the REAL Hope Act, where undocumented students may apply for state-funded financial aid for college if:


You qualify for in-state tuition under HB 1079.

<u>Or</u>

If you have DACA and either you or your parents have lived in WA for at least a year.

Students who qualify can request state aid through the WASFA (Washington Application for State Financial Aid)

Other Financial Experiences of Undocumented College Students in WA

- State-based and private financial aid
- No federal financial aid
- No ability to work on payroll without DACA

DACA

- Stands for "Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals," signed in 2012
- Allows individuals who meet specific guidelines to request deferred action from U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS)
- 2-year renewable work permit costing several hundred dollars
- (Most of the) Qualifying criteria
 - Under 31 and physically present in U.S. on June 15, 2012
 - Came to U.S. under 16 and continuously lived in U.S. since June 15, 2007
 - No felony/significant misdemeanor/more than 3 misdemeanors
 - In school, high school diploma attained, GED attained, or honorable discharge from Coast Guard or armed forces

How to Know if a Student is Undocumented

- They say they are undocumented, DACA-eligible, or DACAmented
- They say they have DACA or need to renew their DACA
- They state they have to sign the HB 1079 Affidavit
- They say they file the WASFA

Do not ask!

In-College Experiences of Undocumented College Students in WA

- (At Evergreen) higher levels of community service than documented peers
- Increased levels of anxiety and other mental health issues
- Concerns for relatives without documentation (same for mixed-status students)
- Often change majors to academic areas perceived as more (financially) helpful in supporting family
- High levels of discrimination from peers, financial aid officers, administrators, faculty, and college police officers
- Few mentors and role models
- No opportunities requiring documentation (e.g. FDA-regulated lab work, travel, etc.)

Post-Graduation Experiences of Undocumented College Students in WA

- Career choice
- Barriers to legal work
- Graduate school (WASFA only 5 years total)
- Owning a business (independent contracting), ITIN
- Going back to country of origin
- Cost of legal advice for navigating these processes

How to Increase Support: "What is my sphere of influence?"

Steer your education (United We Dream resources)

- Detention centers
- Local and campus police policy examination
- Sanctuary status
- Definition and resource handouts

How to Increase Support: Create opportunities to accept/listen to/support students' needs

- Communicate our climate of support
- Know our key resources here at Evergreen
- ICE Resistance/KYR workshops and legal clinics (NWIRP, Strengthening Sanctuary)

How to Increase Support: Administrative Advocacy at the Collegiate Level

- Advocacy for bilingual Spanish language staff, communications, and marketing in crucial functional areas
- Push against administrative and clerical practices unnecessarily requesting citizenship and nationality
- Collaborate with local HSs to train administrators/school boards on undocumented college student experiences
- Work towards scholarship creation preferring applicants from (im)migrant backgrounds and fundraise for endowment
