Elective Description Fall 2012

This class is designed as an introduction to the world of publishing for students who have completed a major research project and want to share their results. The class will explore various journals, magazines, and e-publishing opportunities through library research and seminar papers. Each student should bring an existing paper or research project or proposal to class as a starting point. We will then work together to begin rewriting an existing research paper. It is expected that three drafts will be required. One of the drafts will be peer reviewed by member of the class. We will discuss a wide variety of opportunities including e-publication, blogs, newsletters, and

other venues as well as traditional journals. Students will submit a publication plan describing where they will submit their final revised work. Finally, each student will submit their last revised work to the faculty

via e-mail for review. We will explore where your work will fit and what the most effective venues are for its publication. Group work, lecture discussion, workshops and individual coaching will be used to assist you in completing a revision to your work that will transform it into a submission to the venue of your choice.

You should submit your existing article or research paper to me 10 days before the class meeting via email. (BY October 2) (stumpffl@evergreen.edu)

You should read one book on writing for publication. You can choose the recommended book #1 or another book of your own choosing. Because the field of publication is so broad, you may be interested in anything from blogging to investigative reporting. A good source guide for looking for book choices about writing for publication is Western Nevada University http://library.wnc.edu/subject_guides/writing-for-publication.pdf. Note: there is a type in underline between subject and guides that doesn't show in because of the auto-blue underline here. If this address doesn't work, just google "writing for publication" and it should be the choice at the bottom of the page. You may see some other selections on Google as well: there are specific titles for those in the health professions and other areas.

Expectations

Students

- Attend every class; be on time.

- 4. A final revised paper and a publication plan for Oct 14
